Many Arizonans, including some elected officials, are still uninformed or misinformed about charter schools and there are agencies opposed to charter schools that are deliberately spreading misinformation. School funding is one area of confusion. Did you know that Arizona continually ranks around 49th out of 50 states in per-child school funding for district schools and that charter schools are underfunded compared to district schools by about \$1,872 per child according to the Superintendent's 2007-2008 report? If you think your tax dollars should support your children equally whether they attend a charter school or district school, please let your legislators know. Students thrive at Khalsa Montessori School. With over 200 students enrolled in the charter school, we can only imagine what we would be able to do with equitable funding.

Districts have been advised to seek budget overrides and property tax increases during the economic crisis. These options are not available to charter schools. The legislature is planning to reduce regular school funding in the coming year and we are planning for substantial cuts. There will also be a significant decrease in Proposition 301 funds which support teacher salaries. Proposition 301 is funded from sales tax revenues which are very low.

And the Good News Is......Enrollment is our sole source of funding and we are

happy to report that our re-enrollment and new enrollment numbers look great. We are not planning on cutting staff or programs. We are looking at areas where we can cut expenses and possibilities for additional sources of funding. Creativity and discipline will be required. We are excited about your enthusiastic support for our programs and we are optimistic about the year ahead. We will be sending three staff members to Montessori teacher training programs during the summer and we are collaborating on ideas for curriculum and projects for next year. We envision a wonderful year at Khalsa Montessori School and look forward to sharing it with you.
